The children are clearly ready to learn, and their enthusiasm for a new school year has been very impressive. These are some of the areas the children will be covering in numeracy this term:

Literacy

Y5 – Novels and stories by significant children's authors and Legends.

Y6 – Biographies, autobiographies, and persuasive writing.

We have allocated part of the Year Five and Six timetable on focused work to develop children's understanding of grammar, punctuation and spelling. These skills will also be interwoven into other areas of the curriculum.

Handwriting and Presentation

As always, the school puts a significant focus on presentation and handwriting throughout the curriculum. We demand high quality presentation of children's work, in all subjects, and help them to improve through the *Nelson* handwriting programme. Our aim is that all children in Key Stage two are writing in a joined, cursive style as soon as possible. On occasions, we will be sending handwriting homework and are happy for parents/carers to support their child with these tasks. Reading at Home

Reading continues to be an important focus for the children this year. Pupils will take part in guided reading and reciprocal reading sessions throughout the week.

Reading at home every evening is recommended for 10-15 minutes and this should be evidenced by parents signing their children's reading records, as this is a vital avenue of communication between school and home.

ICT

The children in Year 5 are using a coding website (code.org) to practice basic skills around coding;

eventually leading to them designing their own codes and games. In Year 5/6 the children will be learning how to create emails, how to programme, how to de-bug, use publisher for a specific audience and create spreadsheets/graphs. Two children have been chosen from each class to be trained as ICT monitors to help with the management of ICT around the classrooms. The children will be empowered to be able to locate the correct ICT equipment and set it up for their class mates. It is hoped that this will enable the children to develop their confidence when using computing equipment.



Spanish

Children will continue to build upon their previous knowledge of the Spanish language with weekly lessons delivered by our Spanish teacher, Eva. They will continue to develop their vocabulary and use of everyday phrases.

Homework

Children in Year Five will receive homework on a regular basis – at least three times per week, and are expected to read at home for at least 10-15 minutes each night. These activities support and reinforce their learning in school. Parents can support the school by helping their children with these tasks and ensuring that tasks are brought back into school by the deadline.

Year Six will be given written homework on Mondays and Tuesdays, to be returned the following day. For the remainder of the week they will be required to spend at least 15 minutes reading. Staff would appreciate if parents could sign children's planers on a daily basis, to confirm homework has been completed.

Children can also access a range of educational applications on the school website and are expected to use the *Mathletics* programme at home, to further develop their maths skills. Children are invited to access our homework club which is held every Thursday at 3.30pm. This is a valuable opportunity for children to complete homework tasks in a calm and quiet environment, with the support of Mr. Southworth. Children attending the club are welcome to bring a snack.

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PE/Swimming

Year Five and Six began their swimming lessons at Everton Park this week. These are extremely important lessons in our aim of all children being able to swim at least 25m confidently by the end of Year Six. Please ensure your child brings the correct kit each Tuesday:

Girls: One-piece swimming costume, swimming cap and a towel.

Boys: Tight-fitting shorts and a towel.

Children are also allowed to wear goggles and can bring a healthy snack and drink to take to the baths.

Lessons will move to Thursday mornings after October half term. Children in Year Five and Six will also have dance lessons, with Adele, on Fridays. All pupils are expected to bring their school PE kit in a bag to get changed into before the lesson.



Music

Throughout the autumn term, pupils in Upper Key Stage Two will have lessons with Miss Hardwick, from Resonate Music Hub. The children will be listening and appraising as well as playing instruments to a variety of songs, with a focus on "Don't Stop Believing" (Year 5) and "Living on a Prayer" (Year 6).
